NOMINATIONS & APPLICATIONS

Exchange students will only be considered for admittance to Belmont University with a nomination by their home university. Students must be in good standing with a minimum of a 2.5 GPA. Partner universities may nominate students up to the yearly allotment via Jotform:

Items Required For Application

- Application Form (you will be emailed access to the online exchange application form once nominated by your home university.)
- Official Transcripts from all universities attended. Must be in English and include GPA on a 4.0 scale computed by home institution.
- 3 Demonstrated proof of English language ability. Exchange students will need to send official scores with a minimum score of 550 (TOEFL), 80 (IBT TOEFL), or 6.5 (IELTS). We also accept the CAE, IB, PTE, E3, and Duolingo. A full list of English Proficiency tests and minimum scores accepted can be found online here.
- Financial Documents need to be submitted to verify that the student has sufficient funds to cover living expenses while studying at Belmont. Official bank statements in English will be needed, along with an affidavit of support if the student is not self-sponsored.

VISA PROCESS

Once you have been accepted as an exchange student at Belmont University, we will issue you a DS-2019 form. You will use the DS-2019 to apply for a J-1 (exchange visitor) visa at an American embassy. There are two fees required to obtain a J-1 visa: 1) the SEVIS fee \$350 (I-901) and 2) the non-immigrant visa fee \$160 (DS-160). For details, see: www.fmjfee.com.

 With a J-1 visa, you are allowed to arrive up to 30 days prior to your visa start date and are required to depart the United States no later than 30 days after your visa ending date.

TRAVEL TO THE UNITED STATES

We arrange an early check-in date for our international students to allow them time to acclimate to the US and attend mandatory International Student Orientation. Please wait to book your travel until you have heard from ISSS on when your check-in time and date will be. Upon entry into the US, students are required to

show their DS-2019 form, SEVIS receipt, financial documents, visa, and passport to US Customs and Border Protection. Please make sure to have these items in your carry-on luggage.

LANGUAGE OF INSTRUCTION

COURSE OFFERINGS

COURSE REGISTRATION PROCESS

Once you are accepted to Belmont, the Inbound Coordinator will send you directions for selecting classes before registration begins. You will work with the Inbound Coordinator and the academic plan from your home university to select your classes. You will be allowed to register early for Belmont classes in order to get you your ideal course schedule.

COURSE RESTRICTIONS

If a Belmont class has a required prerequisite, you must demonstrate through previous coursework on your transcript that you have met the required coursework. Many 2000, 3000 and 4000 level classes will have pre-requisites that must be met before registering for the course.

Belmont reserves the right to restrict enrollment in certain courses. Motion Pictures courses (MOT) are not open to exchange students at this time. Graduate courses are not open to exchange students.

TRANSCRIPTS

You will need to fill out a Transcript Request Form before you leave Belmont so that you can receive a transcript from your time here. You can request the address to be your home university or your home mailing address. If you need to order additional transcripts, you may request a transcript them on the Registrar's website.

BOOKS

Belmont University uses a textbook service called Bruin Books. Once you are admitted to Belmont, you will receive an email from Bruin Books asking you to OPT IN or OPT OUT of purchasing books directly from Belmont. You have a choice and may either use the Bruin Books service or purchase your textbooks on your own through outside partners. Make sure to check your Belmont email address, as that is the one that will be used for all official Belmont communication.

STUDENT SERVICES AND STUDENT LIFE

International Student and Scholar Services

The Office of International Students and Scholars provides advising, cultural programming, and services to international students and research scholars from more than 36 countries. Belmont provides visa administration, information and services; advising/counseling, and international student programs. There is an International Student Orientation at the start of each semester for international students, where Belmont provides a welcome luncheon, as well as information about academics, campus resources, and US American Culture. Students will have the opportunity to participate in a number of programs sponsored by our office throughout the semester.

Computer Services

Every student will be assigned a *myBelmont* username and password before arrival, which will give you full access to the school's online systems. You will also have access to all computer labs and wireless internet on campus.

Student Life

From 200+ student organizations to the 17 NCAA Division 1 Athletic Teams, Belmont offers countless opportunities to connect with those around you. Our Fitness and Recreation department offers daily group fitness classes, personal training options, a recreational gym, workout room, racquetball courts and an oncampus climbing wall. INSURANCE

The Department of State in charge issuing of J-1 (exchange visitor) visas requires that each student purchase mandatory health insurance coverage in the following amounts:

Medical benefits of at least \$100,000.00 per illness Evacuation \$50,000.00 Repatriation of remains \$25,000.00 Deductible not to exceed \$500 per illness

Belmont has a dedicated insurance provider for our international students that exceeds the DOS requirements. We will purchase a plan on each exchange student's behalf and then bill their student account for the amount.

COSTS

Belmont University waives the tuition for up to 16 undergraduate credits of all admitted exchange students from partner universities. Exchange students *are required* to pay for housing and meals.

Minimum costs for 2024-2025 is \$8,525 per a semester. This includes room, meals, books, and health insurance. *Subject to change.

PAYMENTS

Payment for anything on the student's account (ex/room, meals, insurance, books) is due before classes begin each semester.
